Understanding "Canada" Claims for Food Products.

Requirements for "Product of Canada", "100% Canadian", "Made in Canada" and similar claims for food and beverage products.





All or virtually all significant ingredients are sourced from Canada

Non-Canadian ingredients are minimal (i.e., less than 2% of the product)

All or virtually all processing and labour occur within Canada

VS.

100% Canadian

Entirely Canadian: All Canadian ingredients, plus processing and labour occurred within Canada

VS



- **1.** The last substantial transformation¹ of the product occurred in Canada (no Canadian content requirement)
- **2.** The claim is accompanied by a qualifying statement, such as:
- Made in Canada from domestic and imported ingredients
- Made in Canada from imported ingredients

Other "Canada" claims

Must be true

No Canadian content requirement unless that is part of the claim.

- Roasted in Canada
- Distilled in Canada
- Canned in Canada
- Refined in Canada
- Packaged in Canada
- Made with Canadian [X]

Assess processing locations



Use clear, appropriate qualifiers where necessary
